### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE:

**Ed Lombardo** came through for us again. His hosts **Gerry Crow** and **Jim Norton** put on a great show for us on wild brook trout fishing in the State of Maine. I want to thank Ed, Gerry and Jim for providing us with a fun and interesting evening.

For those who didn't attend the February 23, 2005 meeting I want everyone to know we have a busy time ahead of us. I'm looking for your help. We need someone to volunteer to be the Wild Brook Trout contact person for TU Regional, from the Narragansett Chapter Representing the Mass/R.I. Council. Please check with me on the "Back the Brookie" campaign. This is a most worthwhile project that is taking shape to publicize and protect the beloved brookie. We need to have a member work on this to help insure that we are heard. Also we will want to keep on top of this project. Anyone who fishes for our native brook trout should encourage our organization's participation in TU's expanding efforts to feature brook trout preservation.

The Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is looking to us to have someone

from the chapter join the Resource Conservation and Development Council (RC&D).

These are two positions we should fill. Please contact me if you are interested. Reach back and raise your hand.

I know I mentioned this before but we are planning to do some projects this year that we will need volunteers to come forward and help us carry out:

April 23, 2005 with United Fly Tyers of R.I. - Kids' Day at Addieville Farms, for fly tying and fly casting instruction. *Note that this date has been changed from April 16th.*

June 11, 2005 with United Fly Tyers of R.I. - We will be instructing fly tying and fly fishing to about 25 ladies from the Healing Co-Op Inc. which is Rhode Island's non profit center dedicated to the support of woman and their families who've battled cancer. This will be held at the Deer Creek Farm in Foster. Ed Lombardo will be our lead instructor. We need instructors, cooks, tyers, etc.

We want to continue with the fence project that we started last year on the Falls River. The date

will be announced.

We are planning to do a study and hopefully repairs where necessary to the culverts in the Wood/Pawcatuck Watershed Area. This will allow the wild native brook trout to migrate to their spawning areas. Spawning limitations are the biggest threat to our wild brookies.

For opening day we are looking for volunteers to give out hot chocolate and coffee with WPWA at the Frosty Hollow kids' pond, and also at Meadowbrook Pond, the Route 165 check station and at the WPWA Headquarters at 203-B Arcadia Road, Hope Valley, R.I.

*Please don't read all this and run for cover. We need volunteers!*

I want to thank **Dan Beltrami** and **Fred Rugo** for joining me at the Mass/R.I. Council Meeting on February 6, 2005 in Marlborough Mass.

## Brook Trout Preservation In Rhode Island

As part of our association with the Brook Trout initiative of the national organization, we are pleased to continue our own work to help our RI brookies. We are basing our work on our own observations, but also on the scholarly work of **Saul Salla**, Professor Emeritus of the RI Graduate School of Oceanography and Zoology. He continues to contribute enormously to studies of our own watersheds and brook trout viability.

There will be more on this work as time goes on. One crucial observation made by Professor Salla that we will be working on is *the detrimental effect of culverts in the upper stream areas*. These culverts prevent upstream movement in low water and thus inhibit spawning. ## Fly of the Month Crayfish

The following pattern was tied at the March UFTRI meeting by instructor Dick Pearce. He said he focused on the crayfish after watching a friend of his catch numerous brown trout using the pattern.

Crayfish propel themselves backwards so the claws are tied over the bend of the hook. The natural propels itself backwards in bursts. Stripping should therefore be done sporadically and with quick pulls.

Prepare for hard strikes. Trout will come a long way for a crayfish which is a big desirable meal when they see it.



### Crayfish

**Hook:** 1/0 – 8 streamer hook 1x

**Thread:** Black 6/0 and Monocord—each on a separate bobbin

**Mouth:** Brown hackle barbules

**Claws:** Two bunches of pine squirrel tail

**Body:** Brown-maroon chenille

**Dubbing:** Brown-maroon

**Legs:** Coachman brown hackle, 1 size longer than normal

**Gills:** Honey-tan hackle, 1-2 sizes shorter than normal

**Antennae:** Stripped brown hackle quills

**Shellback and tail:** section of brown goose or turkey wing—prepared by wiping with thin coat of Pliobond or silicone.

**Weight**

--Colors may be varied.

With the launching of the Brookstone Chapter we, under the national charter (which requires two chapters to enable a "Council), can finally represent our state's own issues with greatly enhanced powers within the national organization.*

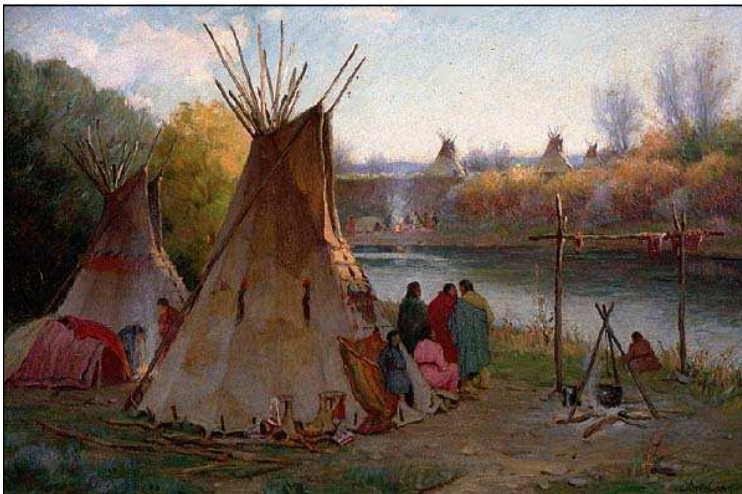
