Presidents Message

I want to thank **Jim Rubovits** for his great slide presentation on his life time of fishing with family and friends. With Jim doing the narrating it was, as always, a fun evening.

This is the last LongCast before our summer break. *I want to go over the LongCast mailing policy with all our members:* I have yet to receive the April newsletter. It's easy to sit around playing the "blame game" on this issue. The newsletter was sent to the printer on time and returned from the printer on schedule to us and mailed (via bulk mail, under our bulk permit) that day. In April we had to push the meeting date up a week. The early meeting date and the unreliability of bulk mail created a special problem for us in April. Bulk mail, of course, is not high priority with the post office. It is almost assured that some members' newsletters will be late. Some people have received their copy but I'm not one of them....I don't want to see the chapter pay three times the postage that we now pay and switch to first class mail. We do our best to create the LongCast as early as possible. But there will always be delayed newsletters, owing to bulk mail treatment.

On a related subject: I received a letter from **Tom Moore** that he will not be able to continue as the chapter web master. So if anyone can step up to the task, please contact me or

Tom as soon as possible.

As you know I have been working on forming a second TU Chapter in R.I. for the past several months. We now have a new Chapter lined up! I have sent all the paper work to TU National for their approval. The chapter will be known as the "Northern R.I." Chapter. I will be chairing a committee to form the brand new R.I. Council. As has been outlined in earlier LongCasts and at meeting discussions, it takes two state chapters to allow a state Council. I will be looking for people from both chapters for the new Council Committee.

On April 23, 2005 we had a very busy day. I attended a meeting with TU Regional in Concord, N.H. on the wild brook trout campaign. I will be looking to form a committee to address this program. Also on this date 22 volunteers float stocked the Wood River, our first float stocking of the year, and their names are listed below. And on this date we joined UFTRI at Addieville Farm for our annual Kid's Day. I don't have a list of the volunteers. If I can get the names of all the TU volunteers their names will be listed in the Sept. LongCast.

On Saturday April 30, 2005 I received the \$9650 grant from TU National for the sea run brook trout study being conducted by Saul Saila and the Wood Pawcatuck Water Shed Association. Of course this

chapter is pleased to help with this work: the check was presented to the WPWA on May 2, 2005.

Our last meeting before summer break is going to be held on May 25, 2005 at the Rt. 165 check station starting at 5 pm. Our chef **Chris Metakos** will be putting on a pig roast instead of the usual hot dogs and hamburgers. This is a special reward for everyone's hard work on our projects and generosity at our banquet.

A reminder: we need volunteers on June 11. With UFTRI, we will be instructing fly tying and fly fishing to about 25 women from the Healing Co-Op, at Deer Creek Farm on North Road in Foster, R.I.

There should be more on May 25, 2005 about the culvert project as well as the fence project. The fence we installed in the Falls River last fall did survive the high waters of winter very nicely; so another job well done.

A final note: if the new chapter is approved by national and you are reassigned to that chapter but you want to stay in the Narragansett chapter just call me with your name, address and member ID number and I will call National and have you reassigned back to the Narragansett chapter. If you are in the Narragansett and wish to join the Northern chapter I can do that also.

FLY OF THE MONTH The Royal Wulff

This is one of the most famous of all attractors. It's a reminder that flies work well that look like nothing you are going to find on the stream. The Royal Wulff might have been designed by Miro' or another surrealist painter sitting down at a tying table with the materials in a typical stash. It looks little like anything that "hatches."

The thing about this one is that it has long been recognized as being worth trying when you can't figure out what is going on or if you don't think anything is going on. It is such a successful fly that it could be worth trying and just not caring what may be going on!

Royal Wulff

Hook: Dry #10 to #20
Thread: Black 8/0
Tail: Moose body hair.
Rib: Fine silver wire.
Body: Peacock herl, red floss, peacock herl.
Hackle: Brown.
Wing: White calf tail upright and divided.
